

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Toast

to Aaron Beverly '10

Twenty-eight-year-old Aaron Beverly '10 of Philadelphia, Pa. made his family and the Central Penn College community proud (actually in awe!) when he placed second in the Toastmasters International World Championship of Public Speaking on August 20, 2016 in Washington, D.C.

To give you an idea of this remarkable accomplishment, more than 35,000 coached and prepared toastmasters competed around the world to reach the finals at the Toastmasters International Convention. Each contestant presented an original speech that lasted from five to seven minutes, evaluated by professional public speakers.

One hundred semifinalists were selected and flown expense-free to the convention. Beverly was among this elite group not


once, not twice, but three times. He's traveled to Cincinnati, Ohio in 2013, Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia in 2014 and the nation's capital in 2016.

After the nerve-wracking semifinal rounds at the convention, ten finalists were chosen.

Beverly describes, "I always get the butterflies before presenting a speech, but I was downright nervous at these last semifinals because I lost at that level twice."

His nerves were for naught, as he wowed the 1,000-person crowd with his speech unofficially titled "57 Words." (You'll have to watch him on YouTube to understand the comedic title.)

Aaron Beverly grew up in north Philadelphia with two sisters, enjoying basketball and other sports and graduating in 2006 from Parkway West High School, a magnet or special admission high school within the sprawling School District of Philadelphia.

“I would change where I went to elementary school; I would change where I went to high school, but I would never change where I went to college.”

In regard to choosing the next step after high school, his mother gave Beverly two mandates: go to college outside the city because she didn't want him tempted to come home too often and, second, don't go too far away.

Beverly admits to being a typical teenager and wasn't proactive in the college search process.

“Essentially, Central Penn College came to me. I received a mailing that was intriguing. The college seemed about the right size. The school was strong in business and I knew I wanted to major in some form of business. I visited campus and immediately liked the independence that came with living in a townhouse. No other college offered that. That sealed the deal.”

Several individuals were very influential to Beverly in his time at Central Penn College, including then President Todd A. Milano and business Professor Howard Davison, but none quite as life-changing as Dr. Dilip Abayasekara.

The upbeat and talented Dr. Dilip, as he is warmly called, led the Student Leadership Institute, an option then open to students interested in obtaining additional executive skills. Dr. Dilip, a Toastmaster, introduced the students to this esteemed organization.

Most students shy away from all instances of public speaking, including Beverly, but he kept hearing about Toastmasters time and again on campus through flyers, lunch speakers, and the always present Abayasekara.

Beverly attended one of the local club's meetings that are held at Central Penn College because Abayasekara played a leadership role in the club. In fact, he was president of Toastmasters International in 2005 and 2006.

According to Beverly, “There are many roles as a Toastmaster. My first role in that [first] meeting was a timer. Members offer to give prepared speeches, which are then evaluated and the evaluators are evaluated,” he chuckles, “but wonderful training is provided through table topics in which you are given a topic and you speak extemporaneously. Tough, but what lessons you learn!”

Former President Barack Obama was also an inspiration for Beverly to take Toastmasters seriously.

He explains, “Barack Obama is such a great speaker. He can communicate and engage the listener. The president was the last catalyst for me to join Toastmasters.”

With a few exceptions, Beverly stayed close to home during his youth. When he learned of Central Penn's cultural immersion program, which is otherwise known as a study abroad experience, Beverly couldn't resist.

“I like to eat other people's foods.”

Beverly and about 15 other students joined Professor Howard Davison on a 10-week excursion in Australia.

“What an experience!” Beverly exclaims. “The immersion program gave me another level of independence. Professor Davison created a challenging syllabus, in which we read books and completed assignments and interviews.”

Now to the food! As a foodie, i.e., food lover, Beverly enjoyed the new cuisine as well.

Food comes up often in conversation with Beverly. As a traveler with Toastmasters, he has tried the cuisine of other countries. As a resident of a large city, he also enjoys the many different cultural food options available in his native Philadelphia.

He did confess that his goal for 2017 is to make better food choices and cook more at home. “It's time for me to get rid of the GrubHub app,” he laughs, referring to the iPhone app that allows you to order delivery food from local restaurants to your home.

“If I wasn't in Toastmasters, I wouldn't have my current job.”

When Beverly graduated from Central Penn, the Great Recession was taking its toll on new college graduates. Fortunately for Beverly, he cobbled together enough hours from two part-time jobs to make ends meet. He also lived at home then, so the only hit was to his ambition.

“I worked as a teller for Citibank and as an administrative assistant with Mass Mutual, which resulted from my internship there,” says Beverly. “These jobs gave me important business skills: banking, customer service, teamwork and handling tough situations through good communication,” he rattles off.

In the meantime he consulted with a search firm which led to JPMorgan Chase, his current employer in Newark, Del. In 2011, Beverly was hired as an account specialist, maintaining data in accounts of ultra-high net worth clients.

Beverly also joined the Philadelphia area Panorama Toastmasters Club, becoming president after two months. He currently serves as vice president of education for two local chapters, a time-consuming role.

One day at work, he heard a familiar clapping coming from the room next door.

"It sounded like the clapping during Toastmasters' table topics," says Beverly. "I joined the group right away."

In 2015, Beverly applied for another position within the company.

"I was interested in becoming a project manager, working on projects that affect the company globally," he says. "My resume was not jumping out to the people who were conducting the interviews; however, one of my colleagues who I met at the Toastmasters meeting at work told the interviewer that I should be seriously considered based on my communication skills," Beverly explains, amazed by the reference.

He received the promotion and enjoys a position that varies daily.

"As a project manager, I am the liaison between the tech side and the business side, so being able to communicate well between both departments is crucial," Beverly says.

He excitedly explains in more detail what he does, but ends up saying, "Let's just say I have a dynamic job description."

"Life is just one big competition."

Beverly is such a strong believer in the benefit of joining Toastmasters. He affirms that the organization gave him direction and brought out his competitive nature.

"The most important skill in the workplace is communication," he asserts. "I was always the quiet one in the room, the one who mostly listened. Now my ultimate goal is to be a corporate trainer for JPMorgan Chase. No one in my high school or college would have predicted this path for me.

For a millennial, I used social media sparingly. Before Toastmasters, I had about 100 Facebook friends. Since I won second place, I have about 1,000 Facebook friends, all of whom saw me on YouTube and most of them live in Asia. With Toastmasters, your friends become international!"

Dr. Dilip Abayasekara continues to coach Beverly. When Beverly asked him how he could have improved the ending of his award-winning speech with perhaps a little joke, Abayasekara asked, "But why?"

Every Monday through Friday, Beverly commutes from his apartment in the University City section of Philadelphia to JPMorgan Chase's expansive campus in Newark, Del. His

commute involves a walk to the train station, then a 45-minute train ride and finally an employer bus to his final destination.

What do you think Beverly is dreaming about during his daily two-hour commute? I'd bet my GrubHub lunch that he is planning on how to win first place in 2017's Toastmasters International World Championship of Public Speaking.

Vancouver, Canada, here comes Central Penn College's Aaron Beverly, and he's hungry!

THE ART OF *emotions*



Graduates Mark Vickrey '80 and Tom Phillips '80 align talents to run Blooms by Vickrey; where flowers aren't products, but feelings you share.

It's easy to be enthralled when you walk into Blooms by Vickrey, a floral shop owned by Mark Vickrey and Tom Phillips. The Camp Hill, Pa. business incorporates artistic design into every facet of its offerings. The carefully prepared and imaginative displays in the shop charge the senses as you enter the different themed "rooms" in the industrial chic space. Gorgeous, fresh-cut tulips, sparkling crystals, spiraling greenery – all radiate different expressions and feelings.

And that, the idea that flowers are a matchless representation of expression, is what Mark Vickrey adores about his job. His favorite aspect of running Blooms by Vickrey is "my connection with people," says Vickrey. "To me, it's not about the flowers. It's about feelings and relating to the people. You're not buying just flowers; you are buying an emotion."

The path to Blooms by Vickrey

Mark Vickrey and Tom Phillips both grew up and reside in the Camp Hill, Pa. area.

"We've known each other since first grade," says Vickrey.

The friends continued to be in the same classes, for the most part, until they graduated from Central Penn in 1980, Vickrey with a degree in management and Phillips a degree in accounting.

Vickrey chose Central Penn because of its close location to his home. It was a two-year school and the program provided "a foundation early on in your major."

After graduating, Vickrey worked at Hess's Department Store, moving his way up to merchandise manager. He took a job at Pealer's Flowers as Christmas help, "just to have a job," after leaving Hess's, and also explored having a desk job, which he "hated." He wanted something more.

Vickrey returned to Pealer's as a store manager, and later accepted a general manager position at a competitor but did not like the environment. That's when he was inspired by his dad's suggestion.

"My dad said, well, why don't you open your own shop?" Vickrey explains. "I started, really, because my dad said so."

Blooms by Vickrey was created in 1997, starting off in a 700-square-foot building. In less than two years, they needed more space and relocated, and six years later Blooms by Vickrey moved to its current 7,000-square-foot location.

Vickrey's business partner, Phillips, was involved from the beginning. After graduating from Central Penn, Phillips worked at Rite Aid, in the corporate office, for several years. Ever since, he has "done the books" at Blooms by Vickrey. Phillips became an equal partner in the business when it became incorporated in 2002.

"The surprising thing about Tom is that he gardens, even though he's a numbers guy," explains Vickrey. "He's very knowledgeable in that area [gardening]."

Vickrey and Phillips are hands-on owners. They are in the shop six days a week (the shop is closed on Sundays).

Floral and people

Vickrey chose a floral business because he feels, "Flowers are a feeling you share. They aren't just products." Blooms by Vickrey was voted as Harrisburg Magazine's Simply the Best Readers' Choice Florist for 2016, an honor they have received for many consecutive years. Vickrey has several repeat clients who he says, "A lot of the times on their orders they'll say, 'Mark knows, Mark knows what I want.'"

He elaborates, "When you walk in to order flowers, we make everything for you. It's custom-made and that's always been our focus. We are not a baby's breath or a carnation shop."

While Vickrey does not have formal training in floral design, he says that he hires those who do, surrounding himself with good people. Also, his team – which has grown to more of a family – is personally helpful to him since Vickrey is actually allergic to flowers.

“A lot of the spring flowers – the hyacinths, the lilies, and especially snapdragons,” he says. “I cannot touch a snapdragon!”

“So we taunt him,” jokes floral shop employee Kiersten Kocher.

Giving back

Vickrey and Phillips host small events in-store such as wine and cheese dinners, fundraisers, and instructional art classes, as well as offering event planning services.

“We do a lot of events for nonprofits,” says Vickrey. “Some of the organizations and events are the Central Pennsylvania Youth Ballet, United Cerebral Palsy Magic Night, American Cancer Society of York, and the Salvation Army Shoe Strut, to name a few.

Kocher adds, “Mark gives a lot too, because we support those nonprofits in many ways. He’ll donate labor in support of those efforts.”

Vickrey has always had a giving spirit.

“One thing I really wanted to be, when I was younger, was a minister,” shares Vickrey.

He is active in his church by helping to plan and construct stage design. Vickrey has traveled three times with his church to a town they support, Sierra Leone, West Africa.

In his personal life, and in business, Vickrey says that he thrives off seeing people happy.

“I love truly helping people,” he says. “It doesn’t matter if it’s just a little arrangement to take down the street to somebody, or a wedding. One the hardest things, but one of the most rewarding things, is being able to help someone with a funeral. I can’t tell you how many times I’ve cried with people. It’s hard, but rewarding. To be able to help somebody through their life changes, it’s one of those heartfelt moments.”

As you can see, design and emotion are interchangeable in Vickrey and Phillips’ lives. And what a beautiful belief that is, as they positively influence the world around them.

GAINS MOMENTUM

Education foundation trustees kicked off 2016 with *Changing the Landscape Campaign for Scholarships Phase 3: Super Suites*.

This \$350,000 campaign gives donors the opportunity to provide scholarship funding for Central Penn students while receiving name recognition on a Super Suite, a newly-renovated townhouse along College Hill Road that contains seven single bedrooms, four bathrooms and a common area.

Each Super Suite is being sponsored for a \$10,000 donation. In addition to name recognition

on the exterior of the townhouse, a scholarship is being established in the donor's name.

At the end of 2016, 25 of the 33 Super Suites were sponsored.

The college administration and education foundation trustees are delighted that so many individuals, businesses and private foundations committed themselves to this campaign. We are eager to see their names on Super Suites in 2017.

The 33 Super Suites, open to first-year students, contain the most popular features in today's college housing: single bedrooms, comfortable and modern furniture,

technology ports and a roomy gathering space. In Central Penn's case, touches of school colors, maroon and orange, are scattered throughout.

With only eight opportunities left in this campaign, the committee is confident that this campaign will be wrapped up well before the end of 2017.

Endowment passes \$6 million mark

In 2002, a few inspirational individuals recognized the need for additional financial support for Central Penn College students. This passionate group established the Central Penn College Education Foundation to raise funds for need-based scholarships for Central Penn students.

A "savings" account was opened in the form of an endowment, in which donations are invested for the long term with only income and dividends taken from the account for scholarships. The original donations are left to grow.

At the end of 2016, the education foundation's endowment with Wilmington Trust passed the \$6 million mark. Just five years ago, the endowment stood at \$2.26 million.

A robust endowment enables the education foundation to plan ahead while annual fund gifts provide the foundation to benefit current students.

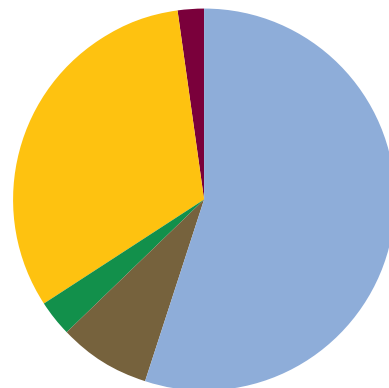

Center for Teaching Excellence enriches online learning

In 2016, the Center for Teaching Excellence (CTE) completed the All-In-One Studio, a three-dimensional sound sensitive space for video recording and enhancement of online learning. CTE Director Judith Dutill worked with the Penn State one-button studio team to create an effective multiple-use system. Throughout the year, the academic leadership team and CTE hosted a variety of professional development workshops. Instructional design templates were developed to assist faculty in course and syllabus development, while maintaining a commitment to academic freedom.

“Unlike daytime and evening courses,

where the instructor has a physical presence in the classroom, online faculty must work intentionally to create a sense of presence in the classroom,” says Dutill. “Students may experience negative consequences, such as feeling lost or unsupported, when their courses lack the active presence of an instructor. The All-In-One Studio provides faculty with the tools and resources they need to create original video and multimedia lessons in their online courses to increase their instructor presence; this will help our students feel more connected to their faculty, to their studies and to the college.”

Donated laptops now available for students

The Central Penn College Education Foundation continues to support CPC students, this time generously donating 10 laptops for student use to the Charles “T” Jones Leadership Library. The laptops come with a helpful carrying case, loaded with all a student needs. Students are able to check a laptop out from the library for one week at a time. “Our new laptop loan program for students has been met with a lot of positive feedback,” says Executive Director of the Central Penn College Education Foundation Matt Lane. “Our goal is to help eliminate barriers to student success – and ensuring that students have access to the technology they need in order to excel in the classroom is one way to do that,” he adds.

Effective Social Media = Brand Loyalty

Social media has become one of the most reliable tools that any professional and/or business can harness. When utilized correctly, the return on investment is hard to match.

The pitfall that many content creators fall into is the thought that quantity trumps quality. While it is important to develop consistent posting habits and engage your audience, thought should be put into the creation process. Ask yourself, “Is this content that my audience will share, talk about and care to consume?” Having 1,000 loyal online connections who care about what you post is more valuable than one million followers who ignore your content.

Pace yourself and find what social media outlet best fits your message. In most cases, this will be Facebook, in others it may be Twitter or Instagram. While all social media outlets have their advantages, it may take trial and error to find the network that works best for you.

Facebook remains the largest and most frequently used social media outlet and in recent months has seen the success of its paid advertising platform increase. Twitter and Snapchat are very popular among younger users, although the ability to target select audiences is limited. Instagram is extremely helpful for promotions that lend themselves to visual advertising.

Connect with other content creators who are relatable and who you believe



your audience would find interesting. If you share their content, they may be willing to do the same for you. Developing a “you scratch my back, I’ll scratch yours” relationship with accounts that have clout can greatly increase your social media reach.

When monitoring your social media, listening can often times be more valuable than talking. Read the comments put forth by your target audience and digest what is important to them. By understanding what they need, you can then frame a proper response that will hopefully spark a meaningful and positive discussion.

Always respond to appropriate communication. It’s easy to ignore a message or comment online, but by doing so, you risk losing that connection forever. Even if you feel the need to “hide” or “delete” an angry comment, reaching out to the person through a private message may allow you to address or remedy the situation.

Attempt to keep a consistent voice, even if multiple users have access to

the account, and post content that humanizes you to your audience. If your posts only promote your service or products, your audience will tune out and stop listening. When possible, provide your audience with “behind the scenes” content and provide human interest content. These types of posts are far more likely to be shared.

Pace yourself and find what social media outlet best fits your message.

Remember, successful social media marketing is not a quick fix and real success doesn’t happen overnight. By producing consistent, high quality content, long-term success and brand loyalty can be achieved. While, flash in the pan viral success is possible and does happen, commitment will be required to achieve long-term success.

"Devon has overcome so much in his life; to see him fulfill his dream is rewarding for me as his former coach and now his friend," says Baker. "His work ethic and determination is why Devon has achieved this level of success."

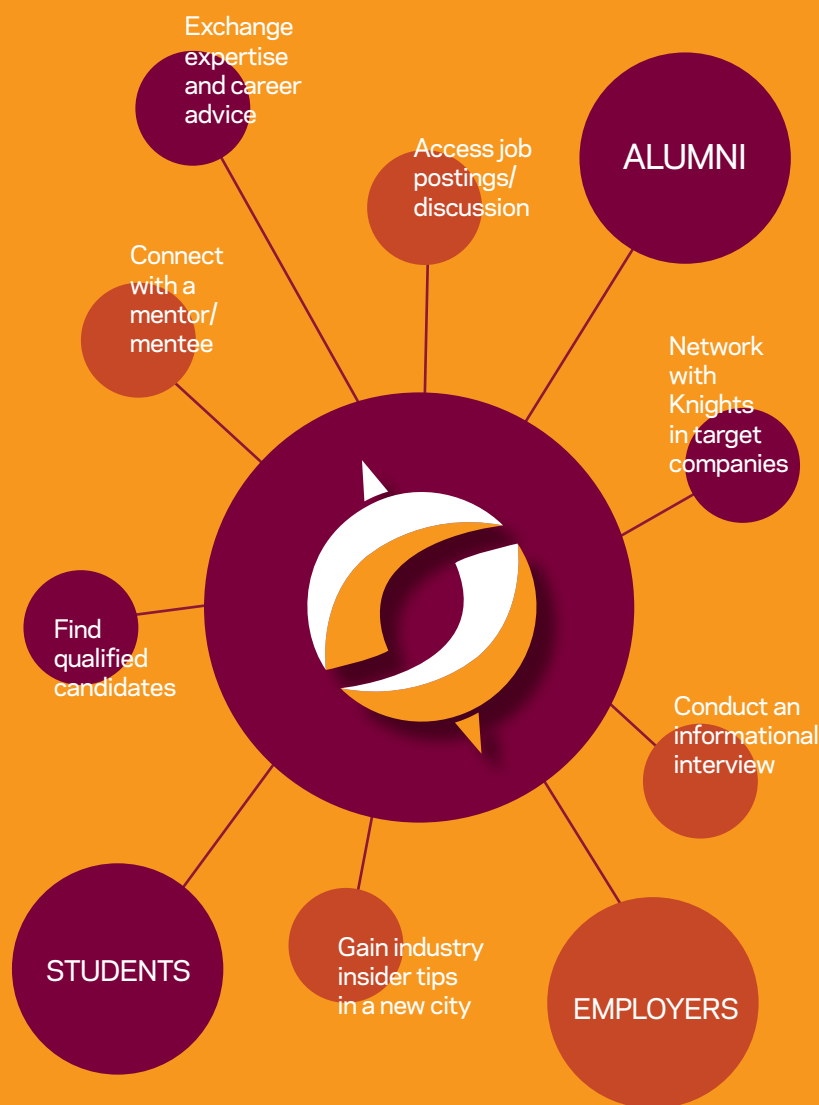

with a new venture. But she was happy to find that those apprehensions were largely unfounded.

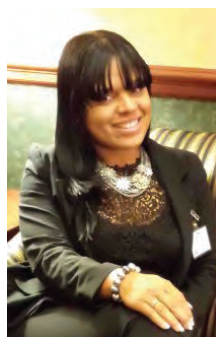

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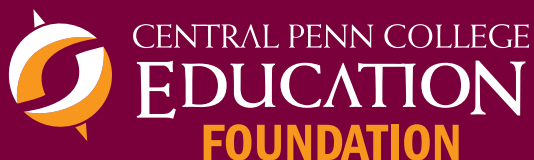
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
