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

By now, many of you know that as of December 1, 2012, for the






Now it's time to honor them with a fund in their name. In keeping with Todd's habit of setting challenging goals, the

Matriarch *of the* Milano family Loyal friend *of the* education foundation By Patricia Brosious

Lunching at Jean Milano's home is a treat for me on a bleak Friday in early November. Hurricane Sandy had just blown through the area and it is a welcome break to relax with Jean, wife of former Central Penn President Bart A. Milano and mother of the college's most recent president emeritus, Todd Milano.

ean's home is warm and comfortable, decorated beautifully with a fantastic mix of collectibles such as Steiff bears and Limoges cases. Living in pastoral Perry County, Jean has a magnificent view from every room. Vibrant fall leaves still hang on some trees on a mountain that fronts the property.

Jean has a sparkle in her bright blue eyes and a contagious laugh to match. We quickly warm up to each other. What women don't like to share stories about lives well lived?

Growing up in Wilmington, Del.

Jean A. Peoples was born in March, 1927 in Wilmington, De. She insists that she had an ordinary upbringing, raised by her parents beside one brother and one sister. Her influences couldn't have been that ordinary, I wonder, to cultivate a woman with her intelligence, generous personality, take-charge attitude and admiration of culture and beauty.

Jean's father was Scotch-Irish, while her mother was of English ancestry. The Scots' legendary work ethic is a distinct part of her. She's also quite a storyteller, some would say like the Irish.

Perhaps her maiden name alone, "Peoples," dictates her personality. How appropriate a name for someone who enjoys the company of others and whose laugh lights up a room!

World War II began when Jean was in junior high. With the men off to war, the resulting labor shortage opened many professional opportunities for women. Jean worked for Wilmington Trust Company, writing stock certificates. When the capable Jean was offered a full-time job at a paltry \$15 a week, she replied with a spirited "No and goodbye."

Instead Jean began work for the DuPont Company as a lab assistant to three Ph.D. chemists. When the war ended and she lost her job to a returning soldier, she went on to become an executive secretary within the company.

Meeting her husband

"Have you ever heard of a trackless trolley?" Jean asks. "It was new to our area in 1945. I rode the trolley from my home to work at the DuPont Company. I noticed a young fellow looking at me on several trips. I asked around about him and evidently he asked around about me. His name was Bart Milano, an army soldier stationed at New Castle Air Base. Our first date was to a baseball game, the Wilmington Blue Rocks. Two years later, in 1947, we were married." After the war ended, Bart Milano



attended the University of Delaware on the GI Bill. He graduated and continued his studies, earning a master's degree, which Jean mentions was quite uncommon in those days.

"I earned my PHTC back then—Put Husband Through College," she quips.

Focusing on her children

Bart's first job after college was as an elementary school teacher. He showed his progressive side even then.

Jean recalls, "Bart was the first male elementary school teacher in the state of Delaware."

During those years, Jean centered her energy on their growing family. Daughter Gale, son Todd and second daughter Teri were born in quick succession in the 1950s. Bart's career in education advanced as he was named the first executive director of a training facility for handicapped individuals seeking job skills.

In 1965, Bart was recruited by Dutch Pantry Restaurants to be senior vice president and director of training. The family's life in central Pennsylvania began when Bart accepted the job offer.

Bart and Jean made a few moves on the east shore of Harrisburg, Pa., until finally settling in a rambling house in the development known as Mountain View Acres, tucked on the mountainside near Linglestown, Pa. Jean pulls out photos of a stunning traditional home, surrounded by trees, elegant gardens and a conservatory in the back of the house that brought nature inside.

Jean is truly a master gardener. I am awed by the composition of the back yard in her photos—a waterfall and pond, pergola, intricate flowered beds and terraced patios with tables and chairs.

Jean's family gathered countless times in that home. She is proud of the grown-up versions of her children and is close to each of them.

Growing Central Penn Business School

Gardens and children are not the only things that thrive under Jean's care. Central Penn Business School became her new focus to nurture, beginning in 1969.

At that time, life was going smoothly for Jean. Her children were keeping her busy and she had lots of friends, remaining close to many in the Wilmington, Del. area. One day, Bart came home from work at Dutch Pantry and presented Jean with a plan to buy the Central Penn Business School.

She agreed and matched her husband's energy, bringing her own natural skills in public relations. Jean took on any job that needed to be done, including bookkeeping, letter writing, reviewing student applications and assigning residences to students.

Jean lugged a projector and literature to high schools throughout central Pennsylvania to recruit students. Bart and Jean worked at break-neck speed as students signed up to begin new careers.

Bart and Jean added programs as market needs dictated. Travel and tourism joined fashion merchandising as popular and highly regarded majors. Jean brightens at the memories of many international trips, accompanying the travel students.

"We even opened up the trips

to the community and met many wonderful people outside of Central Penn," she adds.

Retiring to an equally full life

In 1986 at the age of 60, Jean retired from Central Penn. She spent most of her time gardening, as she was the sole caretaker for her beautiful grounds. When Bart retired three years later, they took advantage of their free time to enjoy even more travel.

Seventeen years ago, the couple decided that their mountain home was too much for them and moved to Perry County, near their daughter Teri and her husband.

Jean embraced Teri's passion for horses. Starting in 1996, they bred Appaloosa horses on the property and sold fillies. Their prized horse, One Fine Dream, was named world champion Appaloosa broodmare in Fort Worth, Texas.

Life changed once more for Jean when Bart died in 2007. They were married for 60 adventuresome years.

Now Jean relishes in the progress of her five grandchildren and three greatgrandchildren. She enjoys her outings to church and occasional concerts. She has a special love for opera. Even though more than a quarter-century has passed since Jean retired, she has not forgotten the needs of Central Penn students. Jean supports student scholarships every year through her donations to the education foundation.

Before our lunch, Jean and I greeted each other with a handshake but we parted with a kiss. Leaving the warmth of the room and her personality, I told Jean that I hated to go.

"That's OK with me but if you stay any longer, you'll have to take care of me," she laughs.

As I was driving home, I realized that Jean's grace before lunch reflected her values.

She said, "Thank you, Lord, for giving us our life and this day. Thank you too for joining together these friends in Christ." Amen.

Now, The Arboretum Society added a new "branch" to its tree: *The Legacy Branch*, which honors individuals with *planned* gifts of \$10,000 or more.

The planned gifts of Ruth (Wierman) Evinger '40 of New Cumberland, Pa., shaped her legacy at Central Penn College. Born in 1913 in Lemoyne, Pa., Evinger was a strong believer in education. After graduating from Central Penn in 1940, Evinger completed her bachelor's degree at the Pennsylvania State University and made her career at the former New Cumberland Army Depot.

In the last decade, Evinger reconnected with Central Penn and enjoyed reminiscing about her college days. In 2003, she established her first of two planned gifts to benefit the scholarship needs of Central Penn students. She wanted to see that tomorrow's students have the same opportunity that she had.

When Evinger passed on August 3, 2012 at the age of 99, she made her mark in the world, and lives on through the annual Ruth Evinger Scholarship Award.

You can make it happen: Dream big

Many great teachers have graced my life. What made them great? Knowledge? Surely. Dedication to teaching? Oh, yes. Passion? You know it.

But the greatest teachers I recall were those who encouraged me to dream, without boundaries or qualifications, and then to pursue those dreams.

And not only did those teachers encourage, entreat, and empower me to dream—they taught me to dream big.

Explore Frontiers

A teacher in particular who encouraged me to dream was Phil Klass, one of my writing professors at the Pennsylvania State University.

How could he not?

Erudite but empathetic, critical but caring, impatient but invested, Mr. Klass was the science fiction writer William Tenn, a man whose work predisposed him to dream big. His alter ego was why I took his advanced short story-writing class, twice.

I had always dreamed, but most adults in my hometown usually cautioned me to whittle my dreams down to a "practical" point.

Mr. Klass saw another way for me to hone my talents. Yes, he helped me write better—he was my teacher. But he also insisted, his unruly gray halo of hair jumping like electricity collected from his lightning-rod finger as it punctuated the air while he spoke, that I dream that I dream so I could grow, and that I dream big.

Dream on...

Lesson learned. I still dream, and I like to dream big. It works: You usually

can't succeed without a plan, and a dream is a plan, a most personal one. Sometimes, a dream is the only plan you have.

At Central Penn, I learned about another educator who liked to dream big, and who, like Mr. Klass, believed in making those dreams come true through directed, determined work tempered with responsibility.

That other educator is the late Bart Milano, who, more than 40 years ago, with his wife, Jean, bought the small Central Pennsylvania Business School and nourished his big dream for the school into the multi-building, multiprogrammed, multi-success college we know today.

Mr. Milano dreamed big, and as navigator and nurturer—a path his son, recently retired President Todd Milano, also followed—coaxed a big dream into a blooming and wondrous reality.

My turn, and thank you

I believe in the often-uttered "giving back." I learned the value of giving back from many teachers, and not only in school. And I'm proud to admit I'm still a dreamer. One way I give back is by striving to provide students with knowledge and insight, with courage to ask questions and to envision a future they will help determine.

How do I do that?

With knowledge? Surely.

With dedication? Oh, yes. With passion? You know it.

But the best method I believe

I employ is encouraging students to dream, without boundaries or qualifications, and then to pursue those dreams.

And I tell them: "You can, and you will."

Central Penn College's EIGHTH PRESIDENT

A distinguished career leads to a new role for TODD A. MILANO

odd Milano relaxes on the covered front porch of his bungalow along the Conodoguinet Creek on an unseasonably warm December day, less than a week after stepping down as president of Central Penn College. The college's board of directors presented

him with a pair of rocking chairs as a thank you gift for his 23 years at Central Penn's helm.

It is a bit ironic to picture the board thinking Todd was going to spend the next phase of his life rocking on his porch as the Conodoguinet meandered before him. As you'll see, this man of lifelong vision and energy still has much to contribute to others.

Todd is pleased that his wife Linda's name appears on the brass plaque on the back of one of the chairs while his name is on the other.

"I am very happy that the board recognized Linda's contributions to Central Penn," he explains. She served for 22 years as corporate secretary for the college's board of directors.

When asked about his next step, Todd is quick to reply, "It might sound corny but I will do whatever my wife asks. I feel an obligation and a desire to serve Linda the way she served me. When we married in 1983, I told her that I was already married to my job. She raised the children and handled everything on the home front. Now it's my time to pay her back." Linda walks by and dismisses her husband's claim.

"Todd has been a very present parent and husband. Yes, his hours were long, but we have always had a good life. I have to admit, though, that the time right now does seem surreal. We are planning to buy a Christmas tree together this afternoon, on a Tuesday, no less!"

The Milano family's legacy at Central Penn begins

Bart A. Milano, Todd's father, assumed leadership of Central Pennsylvania Business School in 1969. At the time, Bart Milano was senior vice president and director of training at Dutch Pantry Restaurants.

According to his wife Jean Milano, "Bart came home from work one day and presented me with a business plan. He wanted to acquire the Central Penn Business School in downtown Harrisburg, Pa. His business plan included relocating the school to Summerdale and the construction of two buildings: one academic facility and one residence hall."

Jean knew that Bart's passion for education and entrepreneurship got the best of him. So she agreed to his plan and took on the challenge by her husband's side. At first, Central Penn enrolled only 15 students.

One year later, the business school opened its campus in Summerdale with 100 students.

Bart Milano was known as a visionary. Many of his practices are still the most distinguishing features of Central Penn: career focused, hands-on learning, professional dress and opportunities for international travel. Bart appreciated outside-the-box thinking and later empowered Todd to practice the same.

While Bart and Jean were putting their well-known high energy into growing Central Penn, their only son, Todd, was a senior at Central Dauphin High School in suburban Harrisburg.

Todd recalls, "At the same time my parents were immersed in this new venture, I was looking at college for myself. Dad asked me to research schools and then we took a road trip to several Midwestern colleges."

Purdue University in West Lafayette, Ind., stood out.

"It was a very good school, especially for those who enjoy math like I do," Todd says. "Also, the swim coach was interested in me and handed me an application during my campus visit. He made a shy teenager feel special."

Todd Milano's first years at Central Penn

Todd earned his bachelor's degree in industrial management from Purdue University in 1974.

"My father wanted me to work for him right away but I told him that I needed to work for someone else first," he explains. "I knew that when I would begin work at Central Penn, it would be a lifelong commitment."

Todd always loved the water so he headed to New Jersey to work in a hotel in Ocean City.

"Today this would be known as my 'gap year," he laughs.

At the end of the following summer, Todd returned to central Pennsylvania. In September of 1975, Todd started working at Central Penn as the financial aid director.

After three days on the job, Todd told his mother, "Thank goodness you raised me. Dad is so intense." He explains, "My father was D-R-I-V-E-N, all capital letters. He achieved remarkable things because of his ambitious nature. My mother says to this day that if my father couldn't be first, he wouldn't participate."

The 22-year-old matured slowly and settled in under his father's tutelage for the next 14 years. "Dad was a born leader and he shaped me into a leader, too, so I am grateful," admits Todd.

Todd met the charming Linda Meiller, legal secretarial, from nearby Camp Hill, Pa., in 1977 while she was a student on campus. Linda graduated from Central Penn the following year and dated Todd until their marriage in 1983. Linda's first-hand knowledge of the Central Penn experience helped her to be very capable partner with Todd as his responsibilities at the college grew.

Central Penn's eighth president

In 1986 at the age of 60, Jean decided to retire. After that, she spent most of her time gardening, as she was the sole caretaker for the beautiful grounds in her and Bart's Harrisburg-area home.

Bart followed his wife into retirement three years later at age 65. The board of directors named Todd his successor as president in 1989.

Jean says today, "Todd has done a tremendous job at Central Penn. He has matched or surpassed what his father did."

When Bart walked away, he never advised his son.

"Todd was his own man. He didn't need our advice," Jean says.

Now she and Bart had more time to continue their love of travel, visiting Great Britain, France, and Italy, among other countries. The couple even bred and sold Appaloosa horses with their daughter, Teri.

Bart died in 2007 at the age of 82.

Todd reflects quietly on a statement made by his friend George J. Miller, Jr.: "You are a boy all your life until your father dies."

Todd quickly began to make his signature mark at the college. Under Todd's leadership, Central Penn evolved from a business school to a bachelor's degree-granting college with locations in Summerdale, Lancaster and Bethlehem and on-site degree completion programs at a number of partner institution locations. Online



programs were introduced and became increasingly popular. Majors expanded to several new disciplines. Todd emulated his

father's famous work ethic; including his habit of sending hand-written notes

to people he appreciated. Somewhat of a lost art in today's electronic world of immediate messaging, Todd's personal touch through these notes, which often included photos, stood out to students, faculty, friends and business and academic leaders around the country. His trademark signature was always preceded with "Keep

Todd credits the idea for an edible business card to Amy (Todd) Nuemyer '98. Legal Assistant. Milano Milano Control Control

Smiling." This is right in keeping with his whimsical custom of attaching a small package of Pepperidge Farm[®] Milano[®] cookies to his business card as personal gifts.

He says, "I took this job seriously and was paid to lose sleep. I was never the executive who worked 30 to 35 hours a week and spent the rest of the time making deals on the golf course or at country club dinners. I had to give it my all. And I hired people who were smarter than I was. I loved my job."

Central Penn has always been known as a college of opportunity. Today, Central Penn's slogan, "You can. You will.," speaks directly to the college's brand.

As Todd says, "'You can.' speaks to the idea of opportunity and 'You will.' refers to students' drive. Partnered together, students will find their career success, but it is still up to them to accept responsibility for where they are in life." Todd says today, "I am one of the luckiest guys in the whole world. I was given the opportunity to lead an organization that has had a huge positive impact on many people. The growth of the physical facilities, programs and extra-curricular activities pales in relation to the direct benefit the Central Penn experience had on its 10,000 graduates and the ripple effect for their families and the communities where they work and live. At graduation, seeing the pride on a parent's face who never thought their child would attend college is my legacy."

Many graduates who were given the opportunity of a college degree consider themselves to be the lucky ones. Curtis Voelker '12 business administration, explains, "President Milano gave me the ultimate compliment when he hired me to work part-time in the president's office while I was a student. Thanks to President Milano and Central Penn, I now have the tools I need to succeed in the workforce while also still living on campus as a resident advisor and giving back by serving as a trustee for the Central Penn College Education Foundation. Had I not met President Milano while in high school, I probably would not have gone to college. When asked about earning my degree, thanks to President Milano and Central Penn, I can now say that 'I can. I will. I did.'"

Dorothy Kronemer '81 travel and tourism operations, remains close to the institution that gave Kronemer her professional start. She says, "Every sound structure begins with a solid foundation. I was fortunate to have Central

from a Central Penn student, to a graduate, to an IBM executive, and then to have been provided with the honor to be Central Penn's 2011 commencement speaker has been a most meaningful journey and one where the foundation and values of Bart and Todd Milano reside in my life."

Marvin Fultz '76 accounting, who knows both Todd and his father, says, "In 1974, Bart Milano gave me the hope to build on a dream. A foundation in accounting was built at Central Penn to have a tax and accounting business, which, after 33 years of growth, was franchised as H&R Block," Richfield, Pa., in 2010. It has been rewarding to have Todd personally recognize my success, faith and integrity."

Todd continues, "I have been blessed with a wonderful board, some of whom still remain from my father's era. I recently stumbled across my dad's resignation letter to the board in 1989. He thanked the board for their service to him and charged them with serving me. I was touched and grateful that they indeed have been such responsible advisors."

Todd Milano decides to step down

One of the most important signs of a strong leader is the understanding of when he or she has taken an organization as far as he or she can. A number of things aligned for Todd in 2012, including his 60th birthday, which pointed to his decision to leave as president.

Always looking forward, the board of directors had a transition task force in place since 2004. Dr. Melissa Vayda, vice president and chief academic officer, was named interim president immediately. During one of his final meetings with Vayda, Todd gave her permission to do things differently.

"Now is your opportunity," he told her. That opportunity will probably not include jumping into the college pool fully clothed in a business suit during the annual Fall Harvest, a tradition of Todd's for the past several years.

Vayda adds, "Over the past 14 years, I have had the rewarding opportunity to walk beside the 'big shoes' that I am now trying to fill. Todd has not only served as our leader, but he has served as my mentor and he has allowed me to grow and change; make mistakes and recover."

Todd likes to say that he is stepping away with one foot. He explains, "I will continue to assist the college's education foundation in raising funds for student scholarships in any way possible. The growth of the foundation's endowment is hugely important to me as I watch student financial need only increase."

He continues, "If I can reach out to the 10,000 Milano-era graduates and refresh their memories about what it is like to be a student with bills to pay, I want to do

modestly about their own philanthropy but the generous couple has helped dozens of students through their annual gifts for scholarships. In all cases, their gifts are given to establish funds in others' names, not their own.

According to Education Foundation Director Matt Lane, "Todd and Linda have been leading donors to the foundation. Todd believes strongly in helping Central Penn students and I am very grateful that he will continue to meet with friends of the education foundation to grow scholarship funds."

Still a full schedule

Todd Milano has always had a number of interests outside of Central Penn. He enjoys taking discarded items and giving them purpose

that. I'd like to work with the foundation staff to grow it's endowment to \$10 million. Wouldn't that be great?"

Todd will maintain office space in the historic Boyer House on campus, which is now the headquarters for the education foundation. His title is now president emeritus and ambassador, as he supports the foundation in its fundraising endeavors. Todd and Linda speak once again. Henszey's Bridge on Central Penn's campus is an example of his passion to reuse materials.

One Sunday afternoon while he was on a country drive with his mother, they spotted a stone bridge abutment under a long-since collapsed covered bridge. The stone now forms a retaining wall in his back yard. Linda wanted a hanging bell for an entrance to the house and

he found someone willing to part with one on Craigslist.

His latest project along these lines was the purchase of an abused 19th century grist mill. When asked "why" he would only reveal his goal to "restore dignity to the historic structure." One wonders if it might someday serve as a venue for Education Foundation functions. Admitting that Central Penn will always flow deep through his veins, Todd would not rule this option out.

Todd has long been active in the community. In 2012, he was appointed chairman of the board of the Cleve J. Fredricksen Library in Camp Hill and Enola. Todd and Linda are also active members of Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church in Camp Hill.

Family life has always been central to Todd. According to Linda, Todd rarely missed an event their children were in and then only when he was traveling for the job. Yet every night, the family prayed together, gathering around the phone on the nights that Todd was out of town.

His children are now young adults, successfully navigating their education and preparing for their careers. He is proud that both children took classes at Central Penn their senior years in high school.



At the end of this interview, the chilled air brings Todd back into his bungalow, constructed just two years ago for his and Linda's empty nest years. In the next few months, the plantation shutters planned for the home's large windows may be closed for a bit.

Todd smiles, "Linda loves to travel and wants to pick a spot, such as Tuscany, and live there for a month or so to better get to know the region. As I said earlier, whatever Linda wants now, she gets. She deserves it."

And whether Linda's goals and interests dictate the Milano's near future or Todd begins to slip in some of his own ideas, they will be a very busy 'semi-retired' couple indeed.



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
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Signatures in higher education

With the flourish of a pen, a signature can represent major moments in life. Signatures on a house deed, a marriage license or a retirement plan are all snapshots of progress, next steps forward. Some of Central Penn College's favorite "next step" signatures are the ones that bolster educational partnerships with local community colleges. In the past year, a dual admissions agreement was signed and finalized with HACC, Central Pennsylvania's Community College.

The agreement with HACC capped off a series of successful partnerships and enables HACC graduates of 11 associate degrees to directly transfer to related Central Penn College bachelor's degrees.

At the September 18, 2012 signing event held at HACC's Harrisburg campus, former President Todd Milano said, "This next step in our valuable partnership has the potential to do amazing things for central Pennsylvania.

It is a win for the community, a win for our institutions and most importantly, a win for the career-focused students who desire an affordable, high-value education. Together, we are committed to serving students who will serve as the backbone of the businesses that drive our local economy." HACC President John J. "Ski" Sygielski added, "It will allow our students to simultaneously enroll at HACC and a four-year institution. They will have the benefits of the cost savings as well as an excellent academic path."

In addition to a one-time \$500 scholarship that HACC transfer students receive from Central Penn, Central Penn formed a scholarship fund in 2012 for HACC graduates who would benefit from need-based scholarships. Other collaborations in 2012 resulted in increased support and flexibility for students. Central Penn students can now use the resources at any HACC library. Also, HACC Lebanon campus criminal justice students who enroll at Central Penn can earn their bachelor's degree close to home through an agreement that brings Central Penn professors to the HACC Lebanon classrooms.

Another important signature in the life of Central Penn College is the Pennsylvania secretary of education's signature on letters that grant approval for new degree programs. On July 12, 2012, Central Penn received the good news that the college was approved to offer its newest bachelor's degree program in organizational leadership.

on-site and online formats, students can enroll in the general bachelor's degree or specific concentrations in emergency operations, government and nonprofit organizations.

"There is a distinct need and demand for leadership skills in the workforce within Pennsylvania and the United States," says Associate Dean of the School of Applied Sciences Patrick Hughes. "The interdisciplinary nature of the new program's curriculum allows interested students to learn how to inspire, lead others and affect change, all while specializing in one of the three areas of concentration. There is a vast applicability of the concepts of leadership in many arenas."

The Job Outlook 2012 survey report published by the National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE) showed that the second top attribute that employers seek on a candidate's resume is leadership, with 77.2 percent of respondents selecting this attribute.

"Central Penn's program truly prepares students to be leaders at the next level," says Hughes.

Studying abroad "Learn, grow and have fun"

rofessor Howard Davison, his wife Mary and 13 excited Central Penn students hopped on a plane September 28, 2012, for a seven-week learning adventure in Australia. The Central Penn study abroad program, known as the Cultural Immersion Program, was initiated in 2004. The Davisons have been managing the program since 2007. Altogether, more than 100 students have participated in trips based in Australia, Croatia, Japan and Ireland/Scotland.

"Our motto is: learn, grow and have fun," says Davison. "Students start learning and growing from the moment they

set foot on the plane. Most students have not been to a foreign country before this experience. Many have not even been on an airplane. And they have fun experiencing all of this with their friends.

Each year, my wife and I plan one or more excursions involving all students. We also guide students in planning their own excursions in groups of three or more. They do the planning and submit an approval request

for the financing of their excursion. They give their itinerary, their learning objectives and a detailed cost estimate of transportation, lodging and learning activities. Last year, from our home base in Zadar, Croatia, students planned trips to the United Kingdom, Ireland, Italy, Spain, Germany, Austria, Hungary and the Czech Republic, as well as many destinations within Croatia. Students learn from researching and planning

their excursions, as well as from the excursions themselves.
