CARL HEININGER '04

A skyrocketing career and education | By Patricia Brosious

"BE PROUD. A CENTRAL PENN DEGREE WILL TAKE YOU ANYWHERE YOU WANT TO GO."

CARL HEININGER '04, systems engineering manager for technology company Cisco, has stayed true to his most important advice to others: "Being in the right place at the right time only works if you are prepared for the opportunity. Work hard to prepare yourself for whatever comes your way so that you can take advantage of it if you choose."

The always-upbeat Heininger has kept an amazing schedule of work, education, service and family life throughout his entire adult life. After hearing about Heininger's professional achievements and diverse avocations, it's hard to believe he is only 39 years old.

WHERE DO WE START?

Carl Heininger grew up in Hollidaysburg, Pa., graduating from the local public high school in 1993. His parents still live in the home in which he was raised, which brings memories of romping in the woods in rural Blair County with three older brothers.

His siblings took the traditional route of attending college upon graduation from high school, while Heininger, as the "baby," he chuckles, was not so sure. In the middle of his senior year of high school, Heininger enlisted in the U.S. Army and began Airborne jump school that summer. He served for four years, participating in Operation Uphold Democracy, the intervention in Haiti designed to remove the military regime.

By 1997, he was safely at home in Hollidaysburg, but without a plan.

"One of my friends said, 'Let's try San Diego. It will be fun."

So off they drove to California, towing Heininger's beloved motorcycle. After three years of lifeguarding and surfing, he was inspired by an ITT Technical Institute television commercial and returned to Pennsylvania to earn his first college degree, an associate in electronic engineering in 2000.

HEININGER'S PROFESSIONAL LIFE SKYROCKETS

Heininger received his first professional job offer in 2000 at the Capital Area Intermediate Unit (CAIU) in Enola, Pa., where he worked for eight years. He started as a technician, "fixing computer hardware," according to Heininger, and ended as technology director with a number of software certifications under his belt.

John Aigeldinger, former program supervisor at the CAIU, remembers Heininger with admiration.

Aigeldinger explains, "Carl is a talented go-getter with a very animated personality. The man never has a bad day. It was great sitting around the table with him and being on his team."

When Heininger talks about being prepared for opportunities, he knows firsthand.

He explains, "One day, I was having lunch with a co-worker at Brothers Pizza in Summerdale and discussing business. A Central Penn College faculty member was sitting nearby and overheard our conversation. He approached me and asked if I would be interested in teaching a software certification course at Central Penn.

Can you believe that's how I became associated with the college?"

Not far into his Central Penn teaching career, then Central Penn administrators Russell Kulp and Carrie Widdowson encouraged Heininger to complete his bachelor's degree. He followed their advice and graduated from Central Penn with his B.S. in business management in 2004.

Working full time at the CAIU, teaching part time at Central Penn and studying for a bachelor's degree, all at the same time ... wasn't it time to slow down? Not for Heininger. Before he even completed his bachelor's degree, he was researching master's degree options. After being accepted at the University of

Pennsylvania Wharton's M.B.A. program and the University of Virginia (UVA) master's degree program in systems engineering, Heininger chose the latter.

"The UVA executive program started with a cohort of 40 and over a 13-month period, we met for intense periods of classroom work,"

Heininger explains. He graduated with his M.S. from the prestigious program in 2005.

In 2008, Heininger was recruited by a consulting company, and then one year later he formed his own business, One System Consulting.

"I enjoy finding solutions for people," Heininger says. "I'm a process guy."

While business was good, Comcast came knocking at his door in 2011 with an enticing offer to build and lead a sales team focused on the largest accounts in the Mid-Atlantic region.

Heininger says, "Comcast was a great company to work for. I learned a great deal."

Bigger and better opportunities seem to find Heininger, and not because of luck. He's one of a seemingly small group of people who are both technical experts and salesmen. After working at Comcast and later as vice president of sales and marketing at the startup tech company Affiniti, based in Austin, Texas, Heininger accepted his current position as systems engineering manager at Cisco.

At Cisco, he leads a team of six that focuses on business solutions for state and local government, K-12 and higher education customers in Pennsylvania and Delaware.

"Cisco is on the forefront of technology in the routing, switching and wireless security markets," says Heininger. "The culture is amazing and it's very cutting edge, which aligns with my personal brand."

No wonder Heininger was chosen as a winner in Harrisburg's Central Penn Business Journal's popular annual

contest '40 under 40' in 2014.

GUY." Heininger scoffs at the idea of an early retirement.

"Oh, gosh, no!" he shouts. Before his career comes to an end, Jeininger wants to be remembered of

Heininger wants to be remembered as being part of a game-changing idea for society—a project or a process.

"Think iPhone," he says. He doesn't want to be in the corporate world forever either.

"By the time I am 50, I want to teach full time at a university, which means I have to earn my Ph.D. in the next 10 years," he says. "I'm researching that now."

In the meantime, Heininger adds to his knowledge and skill-base through new opportunities. In 2013 Heininger accepted his appointment to Central Penn College's board of directors.

"I am a numbers guy and so I am happy to work with the other directors on the college budget, which drives the college's direction," he says. "Also I find that business concepts transfer well when discussing marketing and admissions."



HEININGER IS BUSY IN HIS DOWNTIME, TOO

Heininger and his family live in suburban Harrisburg, Pa, in a sprawling house that is designed for entertaining. He bought the home that sits on three wooded acres because he wants his three young children to have the same exposure to outdoor play that he had in Hollidaysburg.

The home's 10-car underground garage on a sloping lot doesn't house trophy cars, but his love of any motorized vehicle made this space an attractive feature to him. Heininger is not afraid to spend money on things that will return his investment, whether it's the newly installed geo-thermal system for the house or his extensive watch collection.

Heininger stays fit, but not like in the old days of team sports.

"I don't have time for evening adult sports leagues," he says. "Our family lives a healthy lifestyle through nutrition and activity."

DR. ANN BIEBER '77 EDUCATION CHANGES LIVES

r. Ann (DeFebo) Bieber '77, president of Lehigh Carbon Community College (LCCC), is gracious, warm and welcoming. It is easy to understand why her many admirers call her "student-centric." On July 1, 2014, Bieber became president of the multi-campus institution with 7,500 students and a \$42 million budget. Its flagship campus is located in hilly, pastoral Schnecksville, Pa., just 10 minutes north of Allentown, Pa.

The president's office is the latest stop in her ascendancy at the college.

"I started my career at LCCC in 1981," Bieber explains. "My family lived the LCCC experience. My children spent time in the day care here as toddlers and took classes as adults. My husband and I studied here, too. LCCC is a second home to us over the course of 33 years."

Growing up in small-town Pennsylvania

Ann DeFebo was raised in Berwick, Pa., 65 miles northeast of Harrisburg, Pa., a town well-known for its winning high school football teams. Like most others in the community, Beiber's parents did not attend college. She needed to turn elsewhere for specific advice on what to do after graduation from Berwick High School in 1975.

Bieber reflects, "Central Penn did a great job back then recruiting students from rural communities of Pennsylvania. Central Penn was a school that some of my older classmates attended. When I made a



visit to campus, Bart Milano showed me around and told me and others, 'You can do it! You will succeed here.'"

I found Central Penn to be a college that was—and still is—small enough for students to thrive, focusing on skills that transferred successfully to the job market."

Bieber enrolled in the associate degree program in paralegal studies and enjoyed her classes. On the personal side, she met someone very special while attending Central Penn.

Bieber smiles, "The women at Central Penn would often socialize with the men from Penn State in Middletown. That's how I met my husband, Matt."

Bieber worked as a paralegal in Berwick after graduation from Central Penn, but moved in 1979 to marry Matt, who had returned to the Lehigh Valley after college.

"I was presented with two job offers: paralegal from an Allentown law firm and secretary from LCCC. I chose LCCC because I knew I wanted to return to college and felt this position would allow me to continue for a bachelor's degree."

Finding her "Ginny"

Bieber enrolled in the adult program at Allentown's Cedar Crest College to begin her studies toward her bachelor of science degree.

"I met a counselor named Ginny, who encouraged me when I felt overwhelmed at the college," Bieber says.

She continues, "I tell students to 'Find your Ginny' and he or she will help you. Education changes lives. If you are fortunate to find individuals to support you, listen to them. People will help you if you take the help."

Bieber's bachelor's degree from Cedar Crest College was only her second of four degrees in higher education. She continued her educational path by earning a master's degree in public administration from Kutztown University and a doctoral degree from Capella University in educational leadership and administration.

In the meantime, Bieber's talents were noticed at LCCC and she was rewarded with positions of increasing responsibility. *"I was presented with two job offers: paralegal from an Allentown law firm and secretary from LCCC. I chose LCCC because I knew I wanted to return to college and felt this position would allow me to continue for a bachelor's degree."*

Before being appointed president after an extensive, nationwide search, Bieber was senior vice president of administrative services and then interim president.

"I had to think long and hard before applying for the presidency. I was very happy in my position as senior vice president. The application deadline was the day after a board of directors' meeting. A board member hugged me after the meeting and thanked me for my service. 'That's my sign,' I thought, so I applied at the deadline."

She continues, "I tell students that I loved what I did so I was very accepting of whatever the outcome. If you love what you do, you will never be disappointed."

Her calm and confident demeanor, quick mind, high energy and passion for mentoring students combine to make Bieber an amazing teacher, too. Over the years, Bieber has shared her inspirational messages and knowledge as an adjunct professor at Villanova University's graduate school, DeSales University and Central Penn College.

Focusing on LCCC's future

Referring to a thick report prepared by LCCC's office of institutional research and effectiveness, Bieber pours over the facts and figures on enrollment, demographics, tuition, campuses and partnerships. She wants to continue to improve upon the community college's mission to provide high-quality education that is affordable and accessible.

One way is through the college's foundation, established in 1975, which Bieber oversaw as vice president. Similar to the Central Penn College Education Foundation, the Lehigh Carbon Community College Foundation helps students each year by providing scholarships and other financial opportunities. In addition, the LCCC foundation plays a key role in developing new connections to alumni and community members.

With \$12 million in assets, the LCCC foundation was recognized in a research study by William R. Crowe, senior faculty and director of the University of Georgia Center for Continuing Education, as being in the top 100 community college foundations in the country in regard to assets and fundraising results.

The foundation received a large push with the recent donation of \$1.575 million for technology scholarships from community leaders Lisa Scheller and Wayne Woodman.

Bieber believes that partnerships are crucial to LCCC's future. She spearheaded the development of "Many Voices, One Vision: LCCC 2014 – 2017," the college's three-year rolling strategic plan. This plan works to strengthen LCCC's relationships with the military, businesses, nonprofits and educational institutions.

One of the most interesting outreach efforts is LCCC's university center. At this dedicated space on campus, Bloomsburg University and Albright College each offer bachelor's degree programs to students. With seamless transfer of credits, a bachelor's degree becomes much more affordable and convenient for the graduating LCCC student. While the degree programs are limited in number now, Bieber is eager to expand the offerings by partnering with other colleges, including possibly Central Penn College.

Enjoying her family

Bieber and her husband live in Orefield, Pa., minutes from Bieber's office. They are grateful that their two children, both Lehigh University graduates, returned to the Lehigh Valley after living elsewhere for several years for further education and career opportunities.

Son Matt and daughter Natalie are both professionals in business and medicine, respectively. Bieber is eager for the family to expand and is very pleased with Matt's recent engagement at Christmas.

Sharing her thoughts with alumni and students

"Central Penn played a key role in my career," stresses Beiber. "It allowed me to succeed and became the foundation for my future. I want to create the same environment here at LCCC. As I said earlier, 'Education changes lives."

She finishes, "I want to Lead a Culture of Communication and Collaboration."

That's Ann Bieber's LCCC.

Banking and Financial Services Concentration Turns Heads

In January, the college began offering a new concentration in banking & financial services as part of its business administration bachelor's degree program. This program was driven by discussions and collaboration with members from the local banking community, with representation from organizations like Metro Bank, Wilmington Trust, PSECU, Mid Penn Bank and AmeriChoice Federal Credit Union.

"We received positive and constructive comments from the banking and financial services community," says Professor of Accounting and Business Spencer Martin. "This concentration was developed in partnership with industry professionals and leaders as an educational solution to current needs. Local employers are seeing a shortage of credit analyst positions, and often find that employees require additional training once hired. This concentration prepares graduates to step into a banking and financial services career with the skills and knowledge they need to succeed."

So far, feedback has been incredibly positive within the community. A partnership with the PA Bankers Association was developed that allows association members to transfer into the program coursework from the American Bankers Association/PA Bankers Association that has been evaluated and approved by the American Council on Education.

Members 1st Federal Credit Union has generously created a scholarship fund for the concentration, with an initial



contribution of \$3,000. The first banking & financial services scholarship will be awarded this year.

"I applaud Central Penn College for developing a degree that helps address the needs and challenges of the financial services industry," says Pat Noel, Metro Bank's university director. "These students will find themselves with a distinct advantage in the workplace through the concepts and knowledge this degree provides. And, it will give potential employers a reason to take a closer look at these students' resumes."

Central Penn is currently accepting applications for the business administration bachelor's degree program with a concentration in banking & financial services. Eighteenth-Century Scholars

Dr. Melissa Wehler, dean of the School of Humanities and Sciences, and Matthew Vickless, associate professor of English, participated in the 45th annual conference of the East-Central American Society for Eighteenth-Century Studies (EC/ASECS), held at the University of Delaware. Wehler and Vickless were invited to join Tonya Howe of Marymount University and Rodney Maderv of West Chester University as panelists at a session titled "Research in Progress," organized by Jim May, an English professor at Penn State DuBois and highly-regarded editor of The Eighteenth-Century Intelligencer, EC/ASECS's newsletter and journal. Wehler delivered a well-received paper on the Irish actor Charles Macklin and the question of British nationalism in the eighteenth century, using material discovered during her doctoral research. Vickless presented a reflective paper focused on the issue of research involving digitized eighteenth-century

texts, highlighting certain problems digitization creates for scholars. Overall, more than 80 academics participated in the conference, which drew eighteenth-century scholars from across the country and beyond, including several from Ghent University in Belgium.

Writing After College: Some Tips for Workplace Writers

Today's professionals, regardless of their specific fields, simply must be able to write clearly and persuasively. Recently, more than three hundred Fortune 1000 executives identified clear and persuasive writing as a crucial workplace skill (MetLife, 2011, p. 21). As an English professor at Central Penn, I teach a variety of classes aimed to help students develop the writing component of their emerging professional identities. Yet many Central Penn graduates soon discover that the need for writing development doesn't end with graduation. If you are looking to further develop your workplace writing skills, here are some tips and resources.

Think Like a Reader: writing is a transactional tool, used to exchange a wide array of information and opinions. Before you undertake any workplace writing, take some time to consider what you would like to have happen at the other end of the exchange. Identify your reader's (or readers') defining characteristics, core values, and overall expectations of you, and then try to choose words, phrases, and sentence structures that align. Thinking like your reader will help you compose user-centered documents. Purdue University's Online Writing Lab (OWL) contains some wonderful resources on user-centered workplace writing.

Seek Out Examples: although clear and persuasive writing is a universally-valued skill throughout the professional world, many professions employ discipline-specific writing genres. Among the most common workplace writing genres are emails, letters, memos, reports, proposals, white by Matthew Vickless Associate Professor of English

papers, résumés, and the like; however, even the defining characteristics of these common genres tend to differ from profession to profession. A report about an occupational therapy session will have a different formatting, tone, and style than a criminologist's field report; likewise, a business proposal will look quite different from a nonprofit grant application. Seek out effective (and even not-so-effective) examples of the kind of document you need to compose. Try to reverse-engineer them, adapting and adopting the most common of the effective structures, formatting, sentence styles, and tonal characteristics that you discover. The professional writing program at the University of Maryland maintains an extensive list of common writing genres.

Remember the Three Ps (Precision, Parallelism, and Prioritization): no single style rule applies equally to every writing situation, but most workplace writing will gain clarity by means of three stylistic principles. First, aim to make your workplace writing as precise as possible; you will achieve precision when you choose words that are both accurate and commonly used in your discipline. Next, add parallelism to your workplace writing; parallelism means being consistent with the grammatical structures you employ to communicate related ideas, items in a list, and information of equal importance. Finally, your workplace documents generally will be clearer if the information contained in them is prioritized; documents should be organized so that more important information comes before less important information. In most cases, workplace writing that is precise,

parallel, and prioritized will achieve its purpose. Any reputable style guide, including many that are widely available online (like the Purdue OWL), will contain resources on these three stylistic principles.

If you think like a reader, seek out examples, and remember the three Ps, then the effectiveness of your workplace writing will increase exponentially. So remember that writing is an area of your professional life that will always reward ongoing development: make it a point to grow as a writer throughout your career—you'll be glad you did!

Committee Credited for Successful Campaign



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



Central Penn's International Initiatives

Fall 2014 marked the third trip to Asia in one year for Central Penn College. This international initiative and focus on Southeast Asia was founded on extensive research regarding the potential for international student growth. We returned to Asia this February with stops in Thailand, Indonesia, Singapore and Vietnam.

The visits to Asia consist primarily of school visits and fairs, during which all participating colleges and universities set up a table display with information about their college. The students then collect information and chat

with the college representatives. The school visits are smaller and more intimate with usually around 75 students. The fairs often attract 300 to 400 students.

With the help of Central Penn's international recruitment venture, we hope to not only increase diversity on campus, but also to spotlight the diversity we already have. There are several initiatives in place on campus including a new cultural diversity office, a new annual festival—the festival of nations, and a diversity speaking series, where speakers present on topics such as world affairs and women in Islam.

The cultural diversity office is headed by Cultural Diversity Director Romeo Azondekon. Azondekon is working to prepare the college for the arrival of international students by providing resources and training sessions, and establishing partnerships with state and federal organizations.

"Taking these proactive measures will assist in the academic and social success of incoming international students at Central Penn College," says Azondekon.

Championing **Diversity**




